

CHAPTER 5: INSTITUTIONAL SUPPORT

This chapter contains information concerning the departments and divisions that support and complement the academic pursuits of the University.

The Christian ministries division is dedicated to the belief that individual ministry involvement is a vital part of each student's education and spiritual growth. There are numerous ways students can serve in the community as well as around the world. The information in this chapter reviews opportunities provided for community ministries, missions involvement, discipleship ministries, and touring teams in which students apply the lessons they have learned in the classroom in real-world ministry settings. A high percentage of the student body is involved in some type of ministry.

The campus safety department provides excellent leadership in addressing the safety, security, parking, and traffic needs of the campus community. The action report included in this section demonstrates the many positive contributions made through the work of the 17 full-time and part-time staff members of this department.

As a result of God's provision and the excellent work of the advancement division, giving in 2011 increased by 30.6 percent over 2010. This was an increase of \$1.9 million. Due to this excellent and generous support, Cedarville University was able to close the 2010–11 fiscal year with a balanced budget, the 34th consecutive year to do so. A quote from Dr. Brown in the recent 2010–11 *President's Report* summarizes the impact this has on the University and its students, "What a ministry you have, as investors, supporting this endeavor with your faithful prayer and generous giving. Their opportunities are broader, debt loads are lighter, and futures are brighter because you give."

The Centennial Library is a leader in providing an effective gateway to the world of information access and use. The library develops collections and provides access to resources that meet the program support needs of the University's academic community. Further, the library designs and delivers services that empower its users to utilize information resources and technologies independently, critically, and efficiently; provides a physical and personal environment that enhances the educational experience; invests resources in the provision of adequate staff who are properly oriented, trained, developed, and evaluated; participates in the broader regional, national, and international resource sharing community; and advances the image and awareness of the library, its resources, its services, and its staff. Year after year, the library demonstrates its commitment to its purpose by the growth of its collection, collection use, and expenditures.

Cedarville's residence life program seeks to provide a campus community that supports academic success while stimulating spiritual growth, character development, and lifelong friendships. As a result, each residence hall has a resident director who, along with resident assistants, provides oversight for the building, facilitates hall events, and promotes fellowship among residents. Approximately 80 percent of the student body is housed in the University's 16 residence halls.

The physical plant maintains 22 academic buildings and the residence halls and manages renovation projects and construction of new buildings. The department's goal is to maintain and/or improve University facilities through the effective management of resources and to efficiently balance costs, schedule, and the quality of work performance. Though the list of projects the physical plant initiates and supports is endless, the major additions within the past year have been included.

Complete renovation of The Hill (Rogers, Marshall, and Carr):

- connected Rogers and Marshall with an enclosed staircase
- connected Marshall and Carr with a 2-story, central lounge
- converted all three buildings from unit-style to hall-style residence halls
- added air-conditioning throughout
- added sprinkler system throughout
- installed new electrical and plumbing infrastructure throughout all three buildings with all new fixtures in the restrooms
- installed new ceilings, lighting, carpeting, paint, etc.
- converted the “Huffman House” to The Hill RD residence
