THE WILLIAM GIBSON STORY

Although the state of Ohio had chartered Cedarville College in 1887, the lack of meaningful monetary support stalled the school's development. It was a dream waiting to become a reality.

The early years were lean and difficult for the trustees, and their hopes soon faded. By 1890, they were on the brink of abandoning the entire project.

Late in 1891, an influential Cincinnati businessman, William Gibson, passed away. In his will, he left an astonishing \$25,000 estate gift to Cedarville. News of this gift revitalized the trustees and spurred a renewed promise for the young college.


The college formally opened on September 19, 1894, with 32 students. In 1910, Dr. David McKinney, first President of Cedarville College, remembered Gibson's gift when he wrote, "... it seemed as though Providence intended that this work should go on."

Gibson's gift amounted to less than 2 percent of the total value of his estate, yet who can calculate its eternal value?

God used William Gibson and his gift at just the right time in our history.

He can use your generosity to help secure Cedarville's future. We are grateful for our Gibson Society members who have elevated Cedarville to "family status" by including us as an heir in their estate plans.

THE JOHN W. BICKETT SCHOLARSHIP

Daily chapel continues to be the heartbeat of students' spiritual formation. Chapel is complemented by Cedarville's unique Bible minor and vibrant Christian ministries program, allowing students to grow their faith in a variety of discipleship and ministry experiences.

- More than 100 ministry teams serve local churches, schools, social agencies, inner-city outreaches, and area programs.
- More than 1,000 of our students are involved in discipleship ministries.
- More than 2,000 of our students voluntarily participate in missions or ministry at Cedarville.
- All students graduate with a Bible minor in addition to their bachelor's degree.





BEYOND THE CLASSROOM

In 2011-12:

- engineering students represented Cedarville in the Netherlands at the DONG Energy Solar Challenge
- students represented Cedarville as National Model United Nations diplomats, earning second place Distinguished Delegation
- mechanical, electrical, and computer engineering majors designed and built top-five finishing vehicles at the Shell Eco-Marathon Americas competition in Houston, Texas
- 42 recent graduates taught English in China
- 73 education majors were student teachers in local schools
- 122 students studied abroad
- 131 nursing students completed clinical rotations in local hospitals
- 357 students represented Cedarville in HeartSong, OneVoice, and worship ministries
- 420 students participated in local community ministries
- 501 students reported summer internships











INSPIRING GREATNESS

Last fall's G92 Immigration Conference brought Christian leaders together from across the country to discuss the complex immigration issue and its legal, social, and economic dimensions. Conversations from G92 grew and became a national discussion.

Reports of the event appeared in national media, and subsequent G92 conferences have been held at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama, and Concordia University in Portland, Oregon. Bethel, Biola, and Baylor Universities are planning G92 events on their campuses.



VISION 2020

Early in 2011, Cedarville unveiled Vision 2020, a short-term strategic map that will position us to reach our longer-term goals. Among the Vision 2020 priorities is to position Cedarville to become one of the premier Christ-centered universities in the nation.

Three Areas of Focus: Reflecting the Diversity of the

Body of Christ

Cedarville is taking intentional steps to create a more multicultural campus community. By 2020, we intend to more than double the racial diversity in the student body from its current 7 percent to 15 percent by the year 2020. We have implemented a number of new programs, created new staff positions, and formed strategic partnerships with national organizations including the National Hispanic Christian Leadership Conference.

Launching Strategic Programs


Cedarville is expanding its student market by increasing our graduate and online programs. In early 2013, we will launch a fully online Master of Business Administration. This new program will complement our Master of Science in Nursing and fully online Master of Education programs. We are working to develop a graduate program in Bible, funded by the Kern Foundation.

Expanding Our National Reputation

Based on the success of the 2011 G92 Immigration Conference, we have planned an exciting lineup of Critical Concern conferences that present Christ-centered perspectives on key issues Christians face today. Over the next four years, Cedarville will host major conferences that will challenge evangelicals on the economy (2012), sexuality (2013), race (2014), and culture (2015).







LOOKING AHEAD: 2012-13

Shaping the Future of Health Care

After many years of planning and construction, the Health Sciences Center opened this fall. Its spacious labs, study spaces, and classrooms will allow the Schools of Nursing and Pharmacy to expand their undergraduate and graduate programs and provide their students with a world-class education.

Fall 2012 marked our first year to have doctoral students on campus. The first cohort of students to enter the prepharmacy program in 2009 began the Pharm.D. program this fall. The new building provides everything they need to prepare for an in-demand career.
