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### USER EDUCATION PROGRAM NOW SCHEDULING FOR SPRING SEMESTER

Openings for **user education sessions for students** led by Library faculty are now being scheduled for the Spring Semester, 2005. The user education program is designed to have Library professionals collaborate with classroom faculty members on designing effective research assignments and on providing training in the most effective methods for students to locate, use, and evaluate information.

Library User Education faculty also serve the University faculty by hosting **departmental faculty meetings** and **subject specialty faculty groups** to acquaint faculty with the resources, especially electronic, available to their students; with what they can expect their students to know about library resources; and with discipline-specific databases, including hands-on demonstrations. As well, User Education faculty are available to help **staff groups and departments** interested in exploring the applications of electronic resources available through the Library and in effectively using resources available on the Internet

### CENTENNIAL LIBRARY PARTICIPATING AGAIN IN NATIONAL LIBRARY ASSESSMENT PROJECT. OTHER CHRISTIAN INSTITUTIONS JOINING THE EFFORT

After a successful experience in 2002, the Centennial Library will again be a part of the national library assessment project, **LibQUAL**, which intends to measure library service quality across a range of institutions of higher education. **LibQUAL**, a project undertaken by the

Association of Research Libraries, is modeled after the **ServQUAL** system used in business. The web-based, total market survey instrument has been used by hundreds of college and university libraries each Spring since 2000. The survey gathers information on the gaps between users' minimum, desired, and perceived expectations of local library services.

A unique part of this year's effort by the Centennial Library is the formation of a sub-group of libraries, within the hundreds completing the survey, from the Council for Christian Colleges and Universities in order to perform comparative analysis on the results of the survey. This will allow Cedarville to compare itself with a group of similar institutions. In the group of CCCU institutions participating in addition to Cedarville are Calvin College, Geneva College, Howard Payne University, Messiah College, Mississippi College, Taylor University, and Union University.

The goals of the LibQUAL project are to (1) establish a library service quality assessment program, (2) develop web-based tools for assessing library service quality, (3) develop mechanisms and protocols for evaluating libraries, and (4) identify best practices in providing library service. As in 2002, all Cedarville University faculty, staff, and students will be asked to participate by completing a survey on the web sometime in April, 2005. The invitation to participate will appear in a pop-up screen on campus computers. E-mail announcements about completing the survey will be sent several times in advance of the availability of the survey on-line.

**Tonya Fawcett, Assistant Library Director for Reader Services**, is again serving as the Lead Coordinator for Cedarville's participation. Detailed results of the survey for individual libraries, for the group of CCCU libraries, and for the composite group of all libraries will be available in early Summer, 2005.

**Library Resource and Service Updates**

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**NEW NURSING AND MUSIC DATABASES AVAILABLE ON-LINE**

Two new resources have been added to the 169 databases already provided by the Centennial Library. These databases accessible through the library's website provide faculty, staff, and students complete access from the convenience of their computers.



**ProQuest Nursing Journals** provides full-text access to over 270 nursing publications such as *American Journal of Public Health*, *Cardiopulmonary Physical Therapy Journal*, *Journal of Medical Ethics*, *Nursing Management, RN*, *Nurse Practitioner* and *Nurse Researcher*.

Search results are divided by journal types (Scholarly, magazines, trade publications, and reference resource). Included on the results pages are suggestions for additional topic searches and publications for browsing.

Full text, Text+Graphics and PDF of articles are options for obtaining the articles and charts, tables, and diagrams.

Other options for researchers include the ability to set up alerts for both searches and publications. The search alerts can be set up for searches to be re-run periodically for a set length of time. Publication alerts notify you when the latest issue of your favorite journals is available on **ProQuest Nursing Journals**. Links to the articles and publications will be provided in your alert e-mails.



For those using the bibliographic management software, **RefWorks**, **ProQuest Nursing Journals** provides direct importing of citations.

Access to the ProQuest Nursing Journals is available from the library's website → “Databases & Articles” → and then by title “P” or subject, “Nursing.”

**Naxos Music Library** is the most comprehensive collection of classical music available online, as it includes the complete *Naxos*, *Marco Polo* and *Dacapo* catalogues of over 85,000 tracks, including Classical music, Jazz, World, Folk and Chinese music. Standard searching by title or browsing is offered on the opening page,

Advanced Searching allows for searching by composer, artist, period, year of composition, solo instrument or genre. Notes on the works as well as

biographical information on composers or artists can be read while listening to the music. **Naxos Music Library** and all its contents are owned by Naxos Digital Services Ltd., part of the Hong Kong-based Naxos Group of Companies. Playlists can be created by faculty for use by your students. Currently around 200 CDs are added each year to Naxos to ensure that the music library is always complete and up-to-date.

Access to **Naxos Music Library** is from the Library website → “Online Videos, Audio & Images.”

## **4,000,000<sup>TH</sup> ARTICLE AND THREE NEW PUBLISHERS ADDED TO THE ELECTRONIC JOURNAL CENTER**


With over 5,250 full-text titles now available, the Electronic Journal Center (EJC) is a growing collection of on-line journals that can be searched, viewed, and printed from any Cedarville user's workstation. The OhioLINK EJC continues to be a heavily-used resource. More than 9 million articles have been downloaded statewide since 1998. And the use of the service is still growing at 50% annually, with more than 3.5 million articles downloaded in the past 12 months.

With the recent additions of Berkeley Electronic Press, Cambridge University Press, and Oxford University Press, the EJC has grown to include the electronic collections from 33 journal publishers covering a wide range of disciplines. The EJC can be accessed from the Centennial Library web page by clicking on “E-Journals.” As well, there are direct links to the EJC from electronic databases accessible on the Library web page. Once a citation is found in an OhioLINK-provided database, one click of the mouse will take the user to the full-text article in the EJC.


